Phone, Ethernet and Cable Info

Phone

Each residence hall room is equipped with one telephone jack that is connected to the university's phone and voice mail system. Students need to bring a basic telephone.

Answering machines and caller ID features are unnecessary.

There is no charge for local service. Students who wish to make long distance calls should arrange for a calling card through a service provider of their choice, or purchase a prepaid phone card.

Students may also want to explore cellular phone service. Companies now provide free long distance and regional service for a minimal charge that may be more economical in some cases.

Ethernet

Residence hall rooms have one Ethernet 10BaseT network connection that allows students to connect to email, the internet, and all computer lab applications. In order to be able to connect to the network, resident students must have a 3COM or SMC brand 10/100 10BaseT network card. This is different from a modem. All network cards must be tested and certified to run on a Novell network by the vendor of the card. We suggest contacting your local computer store to purchase and install the card prior to your arrival on campus. If you do not have it completed upon your arrival, the Information Technology Help Desk will have a list of local vendors you can contact.

Wireless Internet

All common areas in the residence halls and the entire apartment complex are wireless.

Cable

Each room has a cable TV jack with an extended basic cable package provided.

Students need to bring their own coaxial cable to connect to the TV. Purchase only the type with screw on connectors. Other connectors will allow too much signal degradation.

The Do's and Don'ts of Decorating

Carpeting is only provided in D101-133 and D237. If students wish to bring carpeting for their room, the following measurements may assist you in the purchasing process.

Duchesne 11'x17' (wall to wall)
Mouton 11'x15' (wall to wall)

All measurements are generous to allow for room measurement variations and cutting.

Roommates may also want to discuss issues such as carpeting, bedspreads, curtains, etc. In both buildings, off-white blinds are provided for windows and the rooms are painted off-white.

Students wishing to put up curtains are encouraged to purchase tension rods.

Students are not allowed to nail, screw, or drill into the walls.

Duchesne Hall / Mouton Hall / Apartments (Cedar, Elm, Maple, Oak, Pine)

Duchesne Hall Facts

Duchesne Hall, built in 1960, has a housing capacity of 229 students. Each wing has a laundry facility. There is a large lobby area on the ground floor that is convenient for watching television and meeting with friends. Also located on the ground floor are:

- **Snack and soda machines**
- **Kitchen with a microwave, stove and refrigerator**
- **24 hour computer lab**
- **University Health and Wellness Services**
- **Public Safety**
- **Residential Life**

Each room in Duchesne has a tile floor space of approximately 11' x 17', except rooms 101-133, which have been renovated and are carpeted. The window measures 74" x 67". Furnishings provided by the university include:

- **Two open faced closets**
- **Two desk chairs**
- **Two built in dressers and desks**
- **Two standard length twin beds**

Students are encouraged to purchase tensions rods and curtains if they do not want an open faced closet (47" x 85"). Duchesne rooms 101-133, 135, 163, 202, 230, 237, 253, and 281 have wardrobes with doors. *Most Duchesne rooms do not have overhead lighting, so students are encouraged to bring an extra lamp.*

Mouton Hall Facts

Mouton Hall, built in 1967, has the capacity to house 147 students. Each floor has a large lounge and laundry facility. The ground floor has :

- **Snack and soda machines**
- **24 hour computer lab**
- **Kitchen with a microwave, stove and refrigerator**

Each room has floor space of approximately 11' X 15' and a window which measures 46" x 49".

Furnishings provided by the university include:

- **Two medicine cabinets**
- **Two dressers and desks**
- **Two desk chairs**
- **Two standard length twin beds**

What Do I Bring?

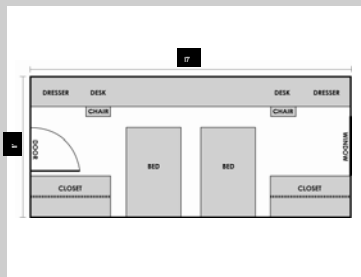
- Desk lamp (Duchesne—floor lamp)
- Small refrigerator (max. 4.5 cu. ft.)
- Microwave (max. 700 watt)
- TV/DVD player
- Personal computer
- Clothing for all seasons
- Umbrella
- Posters/wall decorations
- Stereo
- Small tool kit
- Telephone
- Power strips with circuit breaker (2)
Extension cords are not allowed
- Alarm Clock
- Laundry items— iron, hangers, detergent, and quarters
- Dry-erase/Memo board
- Waste paper baskets
- Linens and towels
- **Standard** sized twin sheets and mattress cover
- **Students are required to bring a Mattress Pad**
- Tension rods for curtains (and Duchesne closets)
- Cups, bowls, plates, flatware, dish soap
- Personal care items (soaps, shampoo, etc.) and a shower caddy
- Backpack
- Bathrobe
- Flashlight
- Snacks

THINGS TO LEAVE AT HOME!

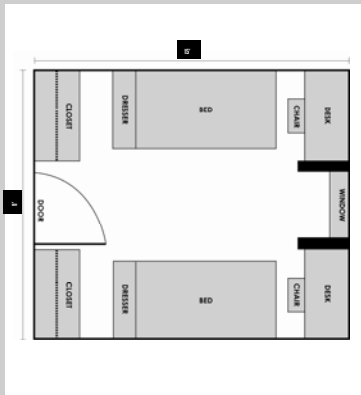
- **CANDLES AND/OR INCENSE**
Burning candles and incense is not allowed.
- Pets—you can ONLY have fish in an aquarium (10 gal. max.)
- Water filled furniture
- Fireworks/fuel
- Open heat source appliances (toasters, toaster ovens, etc.)
- Halogen lamps

Contact your roommate before you arrive so you won't duplicate items like telephones, stereos, refrigerators and TVs. All rooms are air conditioned!

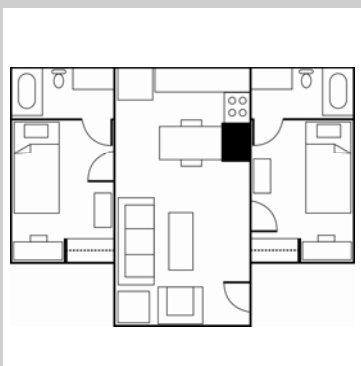
Duchesne Hall



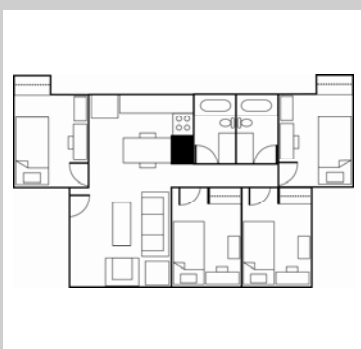
Mouton Hall

Apartment Q & A's

Q. How many apartments are there?

A. There are five apartment buildings each that house 50 students. Each building has five 2 bedroom/2 bath units and ten 4 bedroom/2 bath units.

Q. What are the room dimensions?

A. Dimensions differ slightly from the two bedroom and four bedroom units. A good approximation for each area is listed:
Bedrooms 9'x10' Living room 12'x14'
Kitchen 8'x11' Bathrooms 6'8'

Q. Is the apartment carpeted?

A. All areas are carpeted except for the kitchen and baths have vinyl flooring.

Q. What appliances are included?

A. All major appliances are provided: stove, microwave, refrigerator, dishwasher, and disposal. Additional refrigerators and/or freezers are not allowed.

Q. Is the apartment furnished or unfurnished?

A. All apartments are furnished. Each bedroom has a bed, a mattress, a dresser, a desk, and a desk chair. Each living room has two kitchen chairs, a sofa and matching arm chair, coffee table, and end table. Shower curtains are *NOT* provided.

Q. What other fixtures are important to know about?

- A.**
- Separate heating/ AC units per apartment.
 - Window blinds
 - Egg shell colored walls
 - Multicolor carpet
 - Tub shower combos in each bathroom
 - Two handicapped accessible units in each building

Q. Can we have patio furniture?

A. Yes, if it's specifically for the outdoors. No couches or upholstered chairs are allowed.

Q. Do we need to set up phone or cable?

- A.** No, the following services are provided as part of university charges:
- Phone, cable and internet in each bedroom and the living room.
 - Each bedroom will be a separate phone number with voice mail.
 - Water, electricity, gas, sewer, and trash removal are also included in the pricing structure.

Q. Can we bring a grill and BBQ?

A. Due to fire code and storage regulations, students are **not allowed** to bring a grill. Grills and tables are provided by the university on the patio behind each building.

Q. I hate to cook and I would like to eat some meals at the Dining Hall for convenience. Is there a meal plan available for me?

A. There are four plans apartment residents can purchase. The full meal plan is exactly like the residence hall student plan. The other three are a combination of 75 meals a semester that can be used in the dining hall and flex dollars to be used in either the dining hall or campus café. If you did not sign up for a plan on your contract, you can contact Residential Life to make arrangements.

Q. What additional things should we bring that we didn't need in the residence halls?

- A.** The following additional things will be necessary for apartment life:
- Cleaning supplies
 - Dishwasher detergent
 - Vacuum cleaners
 - Dishes, pots, pans, utensils
 - Dish towels, hot pads
 - TV Stand/entertainment center
